



### **Group Session Document**

#### Ice Breaker:

 Share a time when you felt like your contribution to a project or group was small or insignificant. How did it make you feel, and what was the outcome?

**Short Summary of the Sermon:** In this sermon, we explored Luke 21:1-4, where Jesus observes a poor widow giving two small copper coins to the temple treasury. Despite the small monetary value, Jesus commends her for giving more than the wealthy because she gave out of her poverty, offering all she had. The sermon emphasizes that God does not expect equal gifts but equal sacrifice. It challenges us to consider how we can contribute to God's kingdom with what we have, regardless of how small it may seem, and to understand that the kingdom of God is wherever things are as God intends them to be.

### **Group Questions:**

- 1. How do you interpret the concept of "equal sacrifice" in your own life?
- 2. What are some talents or resources you have that you might be underestimating in terms of their potential impact on God's kingdom?
- 3. How can we, as a group, support each other in identifying and using our "two copper coins" for kingdom work?
- 4. Discuss a time when you witnessed or experienced a small act of faithfulness that had a significant impact.
- 5. How can we ensure that our church community reflects the kingdom of God as described in the sermon?

# **Life Application:**

• Reflect on your daily life and identify areas where you can bring the kingdom of God by aligning your actions and attitudes with His intentions. Consider your home, workplace, and community interactions.

# **Challenge:**
